Despite several days of welcome life-affirming rain that can improve our environment, our air quality almost immediately afterward returned to "poor," with occasional respites of "fair." Also, despite an abnormally chilly United States, a cooling La Niña and predictions of a slightly less hot 2025, January set another monthly heat record. The new global temperature record is an early indication 2025 could see more severe warming than meteorologists first thought.

Hot weather, air pollution and energy bills can be reduced with renewable energy such as solar, instead of relying on fossil fuels. The Citywide Sustainability Plan recommends that the City "retrofit LED street lights with solar panels to offset energy consumption and reduce operating costs or implementing performance-based contracts on the LEDs so that the City pays for lighting based on actual energy savings, freeing up funds for investment in solar energy initiatives." It also recommends that the City complete the Plan to enable the City to apply for funding, again saving money, for projects that will help protect our health and environment.

On its website, the City of "Brea Boasts Solar Savings with Environmental Leadership. The Brea Energy Efficiency and Solar Project is online conserving energy and producing General Fund and Water Fund Savings. There is a positive cash flow from year one with more than \$13 million in net savings anticipated to be realized over 25 years." The project is "creating a more sustainable future for generations" with "improvements at 14 different civic sites, plus replacement of street lighting throughout the city and installation of three new solar power production arrays that supply direct energy for operations," making "Brea one of the largest municipal producers of solar energy in Orange County." The City of Brea received \$3,968,311 in rebates from the California Solar Initiative Rebate Program over five years.

Also in Brea, more than 22,000 homes are powered with energy transformed from methane gas emissions at the County's Olinda Alpha Landfill. Free STA-certified compost and mulch are available year-round for pick-up (bring your own tools) at the Valencia Greenery there. Olinda, which will reach capacity in five years, contributes to the Santiago Oaks Regional Park oak tree restoration here in Orange.



Dear City of Orange Council Members:



I noticed that the ordinance states it is exempt from CEQA but there is no mention of the exemption on the staff report. I thought any potential CEQA impacts had to be noted on the staff report for transparency to the public. Also, it would be helpful to note which adjustments are a result of city or State mandates, so the public knows which agency is responsible for the changes. There are also some inconsistencies in the ordinance. I.E. under 10.14.050 Boulevard and Avenue are abbreviated (under Anaheim Way) but are spelled out in all areas. Also under 10.30.040, should the "Neighborhood Permit Parking Program" be capitalized or not? It isn't in section C but it is in the rest of the report. Just some minor inconsistencies that should've been fixed before it's final
