Introduction:

The Segment Planning Sheet (SPS) is used by the Santiago Creek Commission (Commission) and City staff to set out a vision while identifying possible projects for City Council consideration along the Santiago Creek Area. The SPS intends to provide the City Council with critical information and ensure orderly implementation should the City Council wish to move forward with a specific project. Each project identifies how it furthers the Commission's purpose, the property zoning information, lead department, and specific funding sources (i.e., identify specific grants). The Plan is a living document that can be amended by the Commission to better meet the needs of the City should priorities and resources change over time.

Table Definitions:

- 1. **Recommended Project** General description/name of the specific project along Santiago Creek.
- 2. **Recommended Priority** Scored one through three with (1) representing critical and feasible projects that would immediately improve and promote Santiago Creek; (2) representing projects that would improve and promote Santiago Creek but would require funding not readily available; and (3) representing projects that although would improve and promote Santiago Creek, it would not make a significant contribution, and funding is not readily available.
- 3. **Project Description** Details on what the project plans to incorporate and instruct. Additionally, a brief description on how it would improve Santiago Creek.
- 4. Lead Department/Stakeholders Expected department(s) and/or outside groups to take lead on the project and expected staffing needs.
- 5. **Needed Collaborations** Identify government agencies that would need to be involved in the proposed project.
- 6. **Recommended Funding Strategy** Specific grants the City could pursue to implement the project along with any matching requirements. If a cost estimate is available, this should be included as well.
- 7. **Zoning Information and Limitation (if any)** Detail the project location's zoning designation and any expected limitations or issues that would need to be addressed.
- 8. **Reference Documents** Detail the planning documents, if any, that support or were the impetus for the proposed recommendation/project.
- 9. **Other Matters of Interest** Check boxes that detail if the proposed project carries ecological, scenic, historical, and/or recreational significance/opportunities.



2. SUMMARY

In the Santiago Creek Commission's efforts to develop a strategic plan, the Santiago Creek Commission separated the Santiago Creek into three segments. Over the past several meetings, the Santiago Creek Commission has reviewed individual segment maps, identified respective themes, and came back with segment specific vision statements and project recommendations that aligned with those themes. The purpose of this item is to repeat this process for Santiago Creek Strategic Plan - Segment Three which extends from the 55 Freeway to Hart Park/22 Freeway.

In the Santiago Creek Commission's (SCC) efforts to develop a Santiago Creek Strategic Plan, the SCC divided the Santiago Creek (Creek) into three segments. Separating the Creek into three segments acknowledges the Creek's unique features from its more natural setting in east Orange to the more urbanized surroundings in west Orange.

The SCC adopted a two-prong approach to work through each segment:

- 1. Review the area and property ownership map for each segment and develop themes that will inform a vision statement and project recommendations.
- 2. Develop and review the vision statement and project recommendations that were inspired by previously identified themes.

On January 22, 2025, the SCC reviewed the area and property ownership map for SCC Strategic

Plan - Segment Two. As the SCC finalizes the vision statement and project recommendations for SCC Strategic Plan - Segment Two, the SCC will now move on to SCC Strategic Plan - Segment Three which comprises the Creek areas from the 55 Freeway to Hart Park/22 Freeway.

After reviewing the SCC Strategic Plan - Segment Three area and property ownership map, the SCC will establish themes that will guide the forthcoming vision statement and project recommendations that will be discussed at the July SCC meeting.

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
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
