With our recent historic heavy rain we may not be thinking about other adverse weather conditions but now is the time to promote resilience to the expected heat waves since each of the recent years has been the hottest on record. Almost 4,000 people died from heat exposure in California between 2010 and 2019, the hottest decade on record, according to an analysis of mortality data that included more than the 599 official death certificates. Heat waves have become more frequent and more deadly; 17 months ago a 10-day heat wave resulted in a 5% increase in deaths -- 395 more than expected. High temperatures are deadlier than wildfires, floods and water shortages. Those harmed the most by heat are the poor, the infirm, the very young and the elderly. People die in stifling houses, apartments and trailers they can't afford to air condition. California landlords are required to provide heating, but not cooling.

During heat waves the City of Orange can help to protect our most vulnerable with air conditioning by keeping open the senior center, libraries and community buildings at eight parks -- El Camino, Grijalva, Handy, Hart, Killefer, Olive, Shaffer and Steve Ambriz. Community partners such as the County's El Modena Family Resource Center, schools, service clubs and organizations and worship centers could also open their buildings to provide much-needed air conditioning, as well as water to help prevent dehydration. They can help to identify those with the greatest need and assist with access to federal and other programs for low-income residents to purchase and run air conditioners. Solar-powered generators would help with expected power outages during heat waves. On March 2nd Chapman University will be hosting a community solar workshop open to all residents to learn about programs including group discounts for solar energy, SOMAH (Solar on Multifamily Affordable Homes), and DAC-SASH (Disadvantaged Communities - Single-Family Solar Homes).

The City can apply for grants from the State's \$800 million program to fund projects such as modern cooling centers, planting shade trees around homes, and applying heat-reflecting roofs and pavement, shown to cool the air temperature. Preserving and creating more green space is another way the City can help keep temperatures from rising. Mayor Slater is leading the way in asking the City Council to approve seven members selected for the newly-created Santiago Creek Commission. The City Council is encouraged to further evaluate non-residential uses of Milan's proposed Brandman and Creekside Village sites to keep them as open spaces.







This letter is written to express my deep disappointment regarding the recent decision to grant Conditional Use Permit No 3210-23 to CedarHouse. As a long-time resident of the City of Orange, I firmly believe that this decision goes against the strategic planning goal of enhancing and promoting the quality of life in our community.

Having resided in Orange for 38 years, 32 of those years on North Parker Street and currently living on North Pixley Street, for the past 6 years, I have witnessed the love and care the neighborhood residents have invested in maintaining its charm and tranquility. However, the introduction of a coffeehouse/church to our quaint neighborhood would undoubtedly disrupt the peace and security we have worked to develop and come to cherish.

As a single mother raising two children, I have relied on the close-knit nature of our neighborhood to provide a sense of safety and familiarity. Knowing each of my neighbors on North Pixley Street and North Parker Street has fostered a strong sense of community and has been invaluable in ensuring the wellbeing of my family. Over the last six years my kids have been blessed to live within walking distance of their grandparents' house on North Parker Street. This is the quintessential example of our orange community, down the street, through the alley and up three houses to Mimi and Papa's house. The addition of a coffeehouse/church establishment that will be providing assistance for emotional and psychological health, hosting large events of 40-80 people multiple times a week, with the addition of live music would inevitably alter the dynamics of our neighborhood, leading to increased noise levels, traffic congestion, a loss of security, and damaging to the close connections we have cultivated over the years.

I find it disheartening that the city would endorse a decision that does not align with the planning goals set forth for our community. Our aim should be to enhance the quality of life for all residents, while preserving Orange's rich heritage and a sense of small-town charm. I believe that granting the aforementioned Conditional Use Permit would hinder rather than contribute to this objective.

In light of the above, I wholeheartedly support the appeal to deny Conditional Use Permit No 3210-23. It is my sincere hope that you will consider the concerns raised by many residents, including myself, and reassess the decision in order to preserve the unique character and tranquility of our beloved neighborhood.
